



Trinity College, Cambridge, was founded in 1546 by Henry VIII. Professor Dame Sally Davies is Master and there are around 190 Fellows covering most branches of learning. There are approximately 700 undergraduate and 350 postgraduate students.

Applications are invited for appointment to a Temporary College Lectureship in French for two years. Applicants should have experience in teaching French either in the MMLL Tripos or equivalent, as well as a record of research and publication commensurate with their stage of career. Particular consideration may be given to candidates with interests in Francophone post-colonial contexts (languages and/or cultures) with an ability to offer teaching in one or more related papers in the MMLL tripos (eg. Fr2: Structures and Varieties of French; Fr6: Innovation and Upheaval: deformation and reformulation in the 20th and 21st centuries; Fr12: Ethics and experience: literature, thought, and visual culture of the French-speaking world (1900 to the present)).

French is studied by undergraduates of Trinity College as part of the Modern and Medieval Languages and Linguistics Tripos and also as part of the History and Modern Languages Tripos. Further details are available on the respective University websites:

MMLL/HML are read by approximately 40 of the 700 undergraduates in the college; circa 12 students study French. Currently there are four teaching Fellows in Modern and Medieval Languages: Professor Mark Chinca, Dr Carlos Fonseca, Professor Jean Khalfa, and Professor Emma Widdis.

The duties of a College Lecturer include:

- Teaching of undergraduates in French in supervision classes for at least 12 hours per week during the 20 teaching weeks of the year. Supervision in each topic is geared to the syllabus for the relevant paper in the French Tripos. It is expected that the College Lecturer in French will supervise paper Fr1: Introduction to French Literature, Linguistics, Film and Thought.
- Directing the studies of undergraduate students, which involves advising students on their studies, arranging their supervisions, encouraging their progress and providing letters of reference. There is a generous entertainment allowance to help. College Lecturers are also encouraged to attend the Matriculation and Graduation Dinners.
- Actively participating in the admissions process. This involves carrying out admission interviews, usually over the course of one week after the end of Michaelmas term and taking part in the ensuing selection meetings. There are Open Days each year when sixth-formers come to College, a Residential for prospective applicants in Humanities subjects, and other access and widening participation initiatives aimed at attracting more and better candidates, to which Lecturers are expected to contribute.

In addition, a College Lecturer is expected to devote herself/himself to learning and research in her/his chosen field.

The stipend

The Lectureship will require 12 hours per week of College teaching (for 20 weeks per year). The basic stipend for this post will be £51,917 together with other benefits of College membership. Variation is made for supervision above (or below) the specified amount, and additional payments are made for direction of studies and for interviewing candidates for admission.

The post is pensionable.

Other benefits include an annual housing allowance of up to £1,700 (if resident within 20 miles of the city centre), up to 90 meals (lunch or dinner) free of charge per quarter and assistance with research expenses.
