Research and Teaching Fellowship in the Legacies of Enslavement



Introduction

Trinity College, Cambridge, was founded in 1546 by Henry VIII. Professor Dame Sally Davies is Master and there are around 190 Fellows covering most branches of learning. There are approximately 700 undergraduate and 350 postgraduate students.

Applications are invited for appointment to a research and teaching Fellowship in the Legacies of Enslavement. The successful candidate will be a historian who is able to demonstrate their capacity to pursue and to publish high quality **research** into all relevant archival, printed, material, and visual sources from the seventeenth to the nineteenth centuries, both within and beyond Trinity's own archives. In respect of their **teaching** they will be able to offer effective undergraduate supervision in British, and/or Caribbean and North American, and/or World history from the eighteenth century onwards. The post will be open to early career researchers who will be in possession of a PhD by the start date of 1 October 2023.

The postholder will be expected to dedicate part of their time to teaching 6 hours per week during the 20 weeks of the undergraduate year (120 hours in total) as well as helping with assessing candidates for undergraduate admission and directing the studies of current undergraduates.

Stipend and Other Benefits

- The stipend will be set at £51,917 per annum, together with other benefits of College membership.
- The post is pensionable.
- A residential set of rooms in the College free of rent and Council Tax but subject to charges for utilities, service (if available and subject to certain conditions); otherwise, a housing allowance of up to £4,200 per annum.
- 90 meals per quarter at High Table.
- Access to funds for the support of research and attendance at conferences; and use of all the College's facilities.

Other details

The appointment will be for four years. Applications are welcomed from underrepresented groups.

Application

Applicants should submit:

- a covering letter;
- a curriculum vitae, including a statement of qualifications, publications list and teaching experience, if applicable;
- a published article or chapter from a PhD demonstrating expertise in the *kind* of research that may be pertinent to the post (this work need not be specifically related to the history of enslavement);
- the names of three referees (at least one outside of Cambridge) who will be asked to submit references by the closing date.
